Strengthening Business Practices

This training series offers a comprehensive look at strengthening early childhood business practices. The training modules include: budgets, projections, and planning; financial reports and internal controls; marketing your child care program; and recruiting and retaining staff.

Finding Your Way: Ethical Decision-Making for Professionals *

This training uses reflection and conversation to introduce critical concepts in the NAEYC Code of Ethical Conduct. Participants will practice strategies to effectively manage ethical dilemmas that arise in their work with children, families, and coworkers.
